### Free PowerPC News on Internet

Internet Publishing (London) has launched a new electronic information service called **PowerPC News** that provides information on PowerPC chips, systems, tools, and software and also, to a lesser extent, covers x86-based and other computer products. Every few weeks, subscribers receive a table of contents via e-mail; individual articles are obtained by replying to the service, which then sends the requested items.

The service is free of charge to anyone who has access to the Internet. To subscribe, simply send an empty message to [add@power.globalnews.com](mailto:add@power.globalnews.com). Your address will be added to the distribution list, and you will receive a follow-up message describing how the service works.
